In a delightful little book Camp and Trail Methods by Edward Kreps, the author makes the statement regarding firearms. It goes like this, "many hunters can find fault with and will condemn every brand and style of firearm except the one they are using at the time." I suspect the same is true with knives. If someone is a fan of Case knives. beware when that person tells you that Buck, Kershaw, Gerber or other knives are worthless. You can pick other brands and arrive at equivalent comparisons. In many cases the commentator may not have used some of the brands that are being disparaged or may have expensive favorites that must be placed in the foreground of any discussion.

Cold Steel has the interesting practice of offering knives of the same design but with different construction, and in some cases made in different countries. For example, the popular SRK (Survival Rescue Knife) is produced with the same overall pattern but with different blade and handle materials. The Cold Steel Master Hunter is also produced in different versions. However, some of the less expensive models are also produced in different levels. For example, a very compact and handy model is known
